








At the Mare **Island Navy** Yard, circa mid-February 1942. Note her temporary bow, installed just forward of the foremast.







Photo No. 19-N-26070 USS Pyro (AE-1) circa 1941




Bumper **(SS-333)** with a home coming pennant flying from her mast


